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Featured: Using Personal Stories for Impactful Professional Learning

My grandmother was a wonderful storyteller. She would make up stories to tell my brother and me at bedtime. One series of stories was about Danny and Maybelle, characters whose dispositions and adventures bore a remarkable resemblance to my brother and me. These stories made us look forward to bedtime, drew us close to our grandmother, and remain one of my favorite memories of her. But the stories didn't just entertain. They often carried subtle messages about how Danny and Maybelle could be gentler, kinder, and more grateful. My grandmother wrapped her wisdom, guidance and love in story - a spoonful of sugar to help the medicine go down.



This is the power of story. Stories engage us, connect us and teach us, opening our minds and hearts to ideas we might not have otherwise embraced. As educators we understand the power of story and often leverage it in our professional learning. But, as we move with the impact of Covid on our lives, we seem hungrier for connection than ever before. We need to know we're not alone in our struggle and worry. We need to know other people are thinkingand feeling what we are thinking and feeling. To this end, I'd like to offer a next step with stories as a tool for professional learning. Consider exploring and telling stories about you – your feelings, experiences, and discoveries. I realize as educators we often strive to keep the spotlight off us and on the students and other educators we serve. However, when you share your SIM story – what got you involved, what grabbed your attention, why you continue to implement– you can draw participants even more deeply into the professional learning you facilitate. You allow your participants to see themselves in you, building the connection and trust that opens a door to conversation and coaching. Extending professional learning in this way helps us realize the ultimate goals of transfer to practice and positive outcomes for students.
