As we prepare to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the Center for Research on Learning, I've given some thought as to why this work has endured for a quarter of a century. Obviously, there are no simple answers, but I'd like to share a few of the

conclusions I've drawn. After sharing my ideas, I hope you'll see why we are thrilled to have been involved in this exciting cause with so many dedicated and creative professionals for the past 25 years (thus leading to *"Got the Silver"*) and why we're eager to *"Go for the Gold"* during the next 25 years!

An Important Commitment

About a year after the CRL began in 1978 (at that time we were known as the Institute for Research in Learning Disabilities), we were feeling very overwhelmed by all of the questions and problems that loomed before us and by the limited number of worthwhile solutions that we had. At the time, we were funded by a single five-year grant from the U.S. Department of Education. Given how slowly things seemed to be going for us (it was the proverbial "two steps forward, one step back"; and on bad days, it seemed as if it was "one step forward and two steps back"!), it was quite clear to us that at the end of our five-year grant period, we really would have very little to show for our efforts.

In essence, the problems confronting adolescents with learning disabilities were so overwhelming and perplexing that five years was simply not sufficient time for us to come up with good solutions. When we came to this stark realization, we committed to doing whatever it would take to ensure the longevity of the Center. We knew that worthwhile, meaningful solutions that would result in significant outcomes for students with learning problems would require much more time and talent than we had available to us during those formative years. Although it has not always been easy to keep the CRL ship afloat during the past 25 years, the effort to do so has been well worth it!

Pausing to Check

As with much of life, these past 25 years of growth and development have passed by very quickly. In many ways, it seems like just yesterday that we were doing es 2

the initial studies on paraphrasing and testtaking or that we were trying to figure out an instructional methodology for having students generalize and maintain a strategy! Children who were born to us when the Center was trying to "find its legs" are now parents themselves and engaged in teaching their children to walk! In 1978, the Dow Jones Industrial average was 893, gasoline

was 63 cents a gallon, inflation was 13 percent, Elvis had just stopped singing, *Grease* was the hot movie, and Jimmy Carter was our president! Where does the time go?

Through the various ups and downs that accompany

any journey in education, as we pause to check our progress at the 25-year mark, we see that SIM has become an identifiable entity on the educational landscape. Nearly 60 instructional materials have been validated and published, more than 1,200 people have become members of our professional development network, thousands of teachers have incorporated SIM into their classrooms, more than 3,500 districts have adopted parts of SIM, and, most importantly, the lives of thousands of at-risk students have been and are being dramatically affected in a positive way!

Why?

Although these accomplishments are somewhat encouraging, perhaps the more instructive question to ask is "What seems to account for this growth?" Again, not a question that has a simple answer! In many ways, I think much of the answer is found in an observation made by Mohandas Gandhi: *"Interdependence is and ought to be*

as much the ideal of man as self-sufficiency. Man is a social being." In other words, a 25th anniversary is being celebrated because our accomplishments are grounded in an interdependent mind set that embodies a deep commitment to work together to solve perplexing problems.

One of the errors most frequently committed when speaking about SIM or CRL is to say that *a particular person* "created" or "developed" a particular thing. The reality is that in most areas of life, great achievements are not made in a vacuum.

Children who were born to us when the Center was trying to 'find its legs' are now parents themselves and engaged in teaching their children to walk!

This is certainly the case with SIM. The individual who receives the credit inevitably stands on the shoulders of many who went before or who labored silently in the background. Even those who found those things that *didn't work* helped clear the way for someone else to more easily formulate a more workable solution. If ever there was a movement in which teamwork and interdependence has been essential—indeed, foundational—to all that has been done and accomplished, it has been the development and refinement of SIM!

In short, we are where we are because of a shared belief in and deep commitment to the vision and overriding purposes of SIM – namely, to enable students to learn, to believe in themselves, to have a desire to set and work toward meaningful goals, and to be actively engaged in worthwhile and significant causes that will lead to fulfilling and productive lives now and in the future. There is, indeed, a very significant moral purpose in the work that we do!

Personally, I consider it a great privilege

to be able to work with and learn from individuals of such substance, high character, talent, and deep commitment as those

who are members of the CRL staff and the SIM Network. The contributions of everyone have been important. If any of the pieces are factored out, the overall pattern and beauty of the fabric will be negatively affected. In an undertaking as complex and difficult as helping struggling learners become good learners and ineffective schools transform into places where students not only learn but also come to love the process of learning, the best thinking, commitment, and energy of many is required. Success comes only when interdependence is seriously embraced.

The list is almost endless, but here are a few of the significant people who have made SIM and the CRL what they are today: Those who...

- teach with creativity and soundness
- ask hard questions
- make us laugh and smile
- *really* listen to students and colleagues
- take risks
- provide critique
- suggest refinements
- seek for a better way
- bring seasoned perspectives and caution to the table
- bring unbridled enthusiasm and energy to the table
- fulfill orders for materials and get them there on time
- write proposals so new research can be done
- create graphics and visuals to help us better understand
- write so important ideas can be shared and have permanency
- provide clerical and accounting help
- tend to details so the ship doesn't fall apart

- seek the bigger view so we head in the right direction
- require us to demonstrate our relevance
- sacrifice much personal time and resources
- juggle one more ball because they know how important each is
- build on SIM and make it "theirs"
- come to SIM meetings and willingly share
- set high expectations for those with whom they work
- forgive when others fall short...especially when they tried hard
- formulate policies to facilitate implementation

I'm confident that you found yourself named at several points on this list, which underscores how critical each one of us is to this worthy cause. It's easy to see that if *any* one of the individuals who fulfills a role on the list above were removed, the overall effectiveness and essence of SIM would be negatively altered.

Don't Miss the Synergy!

Our conference this year not only will be an opportunity to celebrate what *all* of us have accomplished in the past, but it also will be a wonderful opportunity to enjoy the many great things that happen when SIM people come together. This summer's conference will be an outstanding opportunity for connecting, for growth, for reflection, for celebration, and yes...for many laughs, smiles, and fun!

Speakers

The 2003 International SIM Conference will feature two special and inspiring speakers.

Rick Snyder, distinguished professor of psychology at the University of Kansas, will kick off the conference on Monday, July 14, with a presentation on "hope." He will be featured during the "Opening Ceremonies," a dessert social from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.

On Tuesday morning, July 15, the spotlight turns to David Rose, coexecutive director of the Center for Applied Special Technology (CAST). In his keynote address, David will talk about the principles of universal design and ways to maximize student outcomes by designing materials with sufficient scaffolding and supports.

David is one of the pioneers of the concept of universal design, a set of principles for designing instruction and materials that optimizes their usability for all learners.

2003 International SIM Conference

David and CAST have a long history of collaborating with CRL researchers. CRL currently has a joint contract with CAST to integrate SIM Learning Strategies and Content Enhancement Routines within a science text chapter. The project will build on CAST's expertise to put the information into a digital format.

Conference Hotel

This year's conference will be held at the brand-new Sheraton Hotel in Overland Park, Kansas.

The Sheraton is conveniently located near shopping and dining and is just 25 minutes or fewer from downtown Kansas City and the area's popular attractions, including worldclass shopping at Country Club Plaza, professional sporting events, the 18th and Vine Jazz District, and more.

The hotel offers 24-hour room service, an indoor pool and whirlpool spa, 24-hour exercise facilities, and a full-service restaurant as well as shuttle service to nearby restaurants.

Rates for rooms are \$119 plus tax for single occupancy and \$129 plus tax for double, triple, or quadruple occupancy. In addition to regular sleeping rooms, a few suites are available at a higher price.

Preconference workshops *Your choice of three full-day, informative sessions*

In conjunction with the 2003 International SIM Conference, we are pleased to offer a choice of three full-day preconference workshops. The workshops will be Monday, July 14. Registration will begin at 8 a.m., and the workshops will run from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., with a break for lunch on your own.

Two of the workshops—Integrating Corrective Reading into SIM and the Content Literacy Continuum and Teacher-Guided Professional Development—will be held at the conference hotel. The third—Building Proficiency in Content Enhancement with the Interactive Organizer Software—will be conducted at a University of Kansas computer lab just a 10-minute drive from the conference hotel.

Building Proficiency in Content Enhancement with the Interactive Organizer Software

Keith Lenz, Janis Bulgren, and Brad Nelson

This preconference workshop will explore the integration of many current and new content enhancement devices using the new commercial version of the Interactive Organizer software. During this workshop, we will review the relationships among different content enhancement devices and then use the Interactive Organizer to link courses, units, and lessons with other instructional materials and Internet links as part of the planning and presentation process. A full day of guided technical training, one-on-one support, and development practice will be provided in a computer lab that is just a 10-minute drive from the conference hotel. The fee for this workshop includes the Interactive Organizer software, user guide, and examples.



Integrating Corrective Reading into SIM and the Content Literacy Continuum

Tara Ebey, Eastern Washington University

This preconference workshop will provide information about instructional techniques for the successful use of Corrective Reading. At the end of this session, participants will have an understanding of the Corrective Reading Program, including an overview of the program and with whom the program is used. Participants will be able to deliver the program in their educational settings. The workshop facilitator will present options for using the Corrective Reading Program as a peer-assisted reading program and will discuss the steps for becoming a Corrective Reading Program professional developer in your area. This session is being offered to help SIM Professional Developers better respond to Level 4 activities on the SIM Content Literacy Continuum. The fee for this workshop includes associated Corrective Reading Program materials.

Teacher-Guided Professional Development

Jim Knight

This session will focus on Teacher-Guided Professional Development. The problem-solving and highly interactive format will enable participants to work on real problems as they learn. Participants will build presentations shaped around partnership principles and learning structures; learn and practice skills required for successful one-to-one professional development; and learn and practice collaboration structures that they can use with groups who need to solve problems or create a plan for implementation during training. Participants will learn new techniques to use for interviewing teachers, reporting data during sessions, planning training, and working with entire districts rather than schools. Professional developers who are interested in a teacher-centered, partnership-based approach to professional development should benefit from this workshop. Participants who already have a copy of the Partnership Learning Fieldbook should bring it to the workshop. Participants who do not have a copy may purchase one at an additional fee.
