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SIM PD shares experiences in Qatar

SIM Professional Developer Brenda Lazarus returned to Florida recently after spending a couple of years in the small Persian Gulf country of Qatar. Her experiences there provide an interesting perspective on the culture and education system of the country.

Brenda says language barriers limited the amount of SIM instruction she was able to provide, but she was able to teach aspects of the model, which she calls "universal."

In the following correspondence with Janet Roth, Brenda shares some of the highlights of her stay in Qatar.

Why did you go?

I originally got the idea to go to Qatar on a Fulbright from a two-week consulting job that I had in Qatar in September 2002. The topic of the workshop was inclusion and the workshops were for teachers at two schools where they planned to integrate children with physical disabilities who had previously been attending a hospital school as the schools were old and not barrier free.

While I was there, I talked with U.S. Embassy people who had co-sponsored my visit with the Ministry of Education in Doha. They encouraged me to apply for a Fulbright to come back and work more extensively with the teachers.

What I did not know at the time was that Qatar was getting ready to launch a huge school reform effort under the encouragement of the Emir's wife, Sheikha Moza bint Nasser al Misnad.

She had already launched reform in higher education by starting Education City and bringing U.S. university branches to Doha. Currently, they have Virginia Commonwealth University (design program); Texas A&M (engineering); Cornell-Weil (medical); Carnegie Mellon (computers); and, this year, Georgetown University (political science) starts.

They had tried to use a magnet school model for K-12 some years back, but it was

not making enough difference fast enough for Sheikha Moza, so she decided to bring in the Rand Corp. and completely reform the system by setting up independent (charter) schools, separate from the MOE [Ministry of Education]. Twelve schools started last year, and 20 more this academic year.

What did you do?

I was approved for a Fulbright for the 2003-2004 year and took a sabbatical from my home university to live in Doha for a year. I was assigned to the University of Qatar, instead of the MOE, for the reason that the MOE was in total disarray due to the school reform and the sponsors did not want to put me into a system that was being eliminated.

My committee made our report in January of 2004, and the president asked me to stay on another year to help get the program started. I accepted the challenge and took an unpaid leave from my home university and went back to Doha as a faculty member of the University of Qatar.

[The diploma program Brenda set up is three semesters. The first students are in their final field internship right now.]

What was the lifestyle like?

Qatar is quite modern as compared to Saudi Arabia in terms of the status of women. The dress and customs are still very conservative and Arabic/Islamic, but women can drive, can be presidents and heads of education institutions. The university is still segregated for undergraduate men and women, with a cement wall separating the campus and faculty having to cross at checkpoints to teach on one side or the other.

I read where the women were given the right to vote and run for office recently.

One of my colleagues in the education college ran for the council, which is the group that is governing in the waiting period for the constitution to be approved. She told me that three women ran and none were elected, but the Emir appointed one of the women to a vacancy that came about.

There will be elections sometime in the future, but the date was not yet set at the time I left. It had been a couple of years of the council making recommendations to the Emir and his cabinet; not like Iraq where all of this is happening at warp speed.

I found the wife of the present Emir to be a very interesting and liberating person. Do you have any observations about her and what she is doing?

She is very pro-women and has done much to encourage young Qatari women to pursue higher education in England and now, in the U.S. Prior to the last few years, more Ph.D.s were obtained from Egypt (in Arabic) and a few from the U.K.

Some consider her behavior shocking as she has allowed her picture to be in the newspaper (there were no pictures of Qatari women in the paper 10 years ago). She lets a bit of hair show under her shaila (head scarf), and when in the U.S., has been shown in the paper and on TV in Western dress.

underprepared student-athletes at KU. I gave everyone the Stanford Diagnostic Reading Test (comprehension and vocabulary). We used the information as a general screening tool. I chose the SDRT because it was group administered, quick, and easily scored. The Gates-Mac-Ginitie and GRADE would work just as well if not better.

In addition, students completed an informal essay writing assessment. They were required to write a short essay on a selected topic. The essay was scored using criteria from the *Theme Writing* or *Paragraph Writing Strategy*.

I also administered an informal algebra test created by our math department. We looked at high school GPA in core courses, SAT/ACT scores, and information about attitude and academic focus provided by coaches who recruited the students to KU.

Finally, we administered some surveys designed to measure student academic motivation (LASSI) and sense of hope (Snyder's Hope Scale) for the future. Our goal was to quickly identify students who fit the profile of students who would require careful academic monitoring and skill interventions.

We have a well-organized admissions process (and clearing process of already enrolled students). All of our new students must enroll in a fall semester (twice a week), non-credit, seven-week seminar ("FYE 699 Learning Strategies") during which we orient them to the "setting demands" of college, the functions of ALP, tell them about and show them how to use their accommodations (e.g., extended time tests), and teach them a batch of Learning Strategies.

We introduce the strategies in a group setting (Describe and Model stages, and a little Controlled Practice), let students "cherry pick," and then follow up with one-on-one for the strategies they think they can use.

t Southwestern Michigan College, we teach the *Sentence Writing Strategy* in our developmental freshman composition course. Students place into that course on the basis of their Compass assessment--our entrance exam for all new students. The *SW Strategy* student lessons book *is* the textbook for that class. Every section of this course has a "shadow" instructor, a TA, if you will, whom I have trained to support the instructor (who is also trained.)

In order to pass this class, the students must master the strategy, but for outcomes assessment purposes, they must also pass an exit exam that enables them to register for the regular freshman comp course.

We're gathering the data now, but it appears that adopting the *SW Strategy* for the developmental English curriculum is responsible for increasing pass rates.
