Trademarks! KU-CRL takes steps to legally protect SIM & CLC

KU-CRL has taken steps to legally protect the Strategic Instruction Model and Content Literacy Continuum as registered trademarks. It is important for all of us to use the [™] symbol when we use these

terms and their logos in our materials. This article contains guidelines and tips for such use.

The decades of research and development conducted at KU-CRL have produced valuable results for students, teachers, and the education field. Along the way, our reputation for excellence has grown, too. To protect that reputation and further build goodwill and recognition in the field,



we have taken steps to legally protect two of our most valuable assets: the Strategic Instruction Model and Content Literacy Continuum.

Applications to trademark these terms and their logos are under review; within the next few months, we expect to obtain registered trademark status from the federal government.

In the interim, use of the TM symbol

serves as notice that we are using these terms and logos as trademarks. It is important that they be used properly to protect the reputation of KU-CRL, SIM, and CLC.

When should I use the $^{\text{\tiny TM}}$ symbol?

When you use these terms, include the [™] symbol as shown below:

- Strategic Instruction ModelTM
- Content Literacy ContinuumTM

It is especially important to use these in advertisements and materials promoting workshops and the first time the term is used in articles or other text. It is not necessary to use the symbol every time the words are used in printed material, but certainly

use the symbol on *first reference* in text and on *prominent* uses of the term (such as headings). If you question whether use of the symbol is necessary, use it. Note that in addition to using the trademark symbol, the first letter of each word should be capitalized.

How can I obtain SIM and CLC logos?

KU-CRL has prepared official SIM and CLC logos that incorporate the symbol. If you have old versions of these logos, please discard them and download the new logos from our web site:

Once the federal government has granted trademark status to the terms and logos, [®] will replace [™]. We will send another announcement at that time.

How do I insert [™] in my documents?

- On Mac computers, use the key combination Option-2 to insert TM.
- On PCs, use the key combination Alt-0153 to insert [™] (hold down the Alt key while you type the numbers)

OR

In some PC applications, type (tm) and the program will insert the symbol. You must type the parentheses for this option to work.

If these suggestions do not work for you, please contact your technical support person for help.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT TIP

Suggested practice materials for comprehension strategies

Recently, SIM PD **Sue Meyer** of Cary, Ill., asked the members of the SIMTRAINER-L listserve for help finding appropriate reading materials for high school students:

I am looking for high school reading support material (control and guided practice) for the comprehension strategies. We have exhausted Jamestown Timed Readings.

Here are some of the suggestions resulting from Sue's request:

The Kim Marshall Series from Educator's Publishing Service has nonfiction short essays with five or so paragraphs. Some of the other publications by Jamestown also have readings of nonfiction at various levels. Some are longer than others. I am finding it difficult to find readings for fiction.

How about the Building Reading Skills set by Brigance, found at www.brigance.net or 1-800-221-1274? I have used them with middle schoolers who are fully included in mainstream classes, who were simply enrolled in my SIM Learning Strategies classes. They loved them! Jamestown also has 6 Way Paragraphs in the Content Areas—which I have used and like. The passages have varying numbers of paragraphs (typically four or five), but they offer a lot of different topics in science, humanities, social studies, and math. The topics are age-appropriate for high school and are written at a higher level. They have an introductory level, middle, and advanced (grade levels 4-12).

You may also be aware of www.echelper.com for passages with comprehension questions. The membership is \$39 a year for unlimited access. Our Virginia CLC middle schools and high schools are using this site for the reading strategies and really like the variety of subjects, topics, fiction, and nonfiction available.

NCLD recognizes distinguished achievement

Don Deshler received the Distinguished Education Achievement Award from the National Center for Learning Disabilities during NCLD's 30th anniversary celebration April 25.

NCLD cited Don's first-hand experiences as a former junior high school teacher and his work with his colleagues to design and validate the Strategic Instruction

Model and to develop the Content Literacy Continuum.

NCLD conferred the award during its annual benefit dinner, "Voices of our Children, Voices of our Future," which was held in New York City. Two others received awards during the dinner:

• Clay Aiken, recording artist, *American Idol* contestant, and former special education teacher, received the Children's Advocacy Award. Aiken created the Bubel/Aiken Foundation, which promotes and funds educational and recreational programs for children with special needs and advocates for their inte-

gration into the environments of their non-disabled peers.

• Art Ryan, Prudential chairman and CEO, received the Spirit of Achievement Award. Ryan is an active leader in efforts that build communities and provide improved educational opportunities for America's children.

"These three extraordinary individuals serve as role models of leadership and advocacy," said James Wendorf, NCLD's executive director. "They exemplify NCLD's outreach to children, parents, educators, and policy-makers over the past three decades."

Don also recently received LD Online's Inspiration Award. LD Online announced the award in fall 2006, and Don received it during the annual meeting of the Council for Exceptional Children Division for Learning Disabilities in April.

Barb Ehren accepts new position

Barb Ehren has accepted a position at the University of Central Florida in Orlando as the director of a new doctoral program in language and literacy, beginning June 25, 2007. Although she will no longer be a fulltime employee of KU, she intends to remain active in the research and development work of KU-CRL in adolescent literacy in general and the CLC specifically, as well as in the professional development leadership work of the center.

Barb's contributions to the work of KU-CRL have been innumerable and highly significant. Among other things, she was one of the main authors on the reading modules for the Online Academy, a leader in conceptualizing the Content Literacy Continuum—the framework used by the center to drive its whole-school improvement efforts—and an innovator in many of our professional development initiatives.

Barb is one of the most highly regarded leaders in the speech and language profession, having been named an ASHA Fellow about five years ago.

It is a great compliment to have been recruited to provide leadership to the new doctoral program at the University of Central Florida. This is a choice professional opportunity for her. While we will greatly miss having Barb being associated with KU-CRL on a full-time basis, we are thrilled that she will continue her close affiliation with the center on several of its projects-especially in the area of professional development and school change. We are profoundly grateful for all that she has done to enrich the work of KU-CRL and wish Barb the very best in this new chapter of her life.
