Two fabulous keynotes

Annemarie Sullivan Palincsar

Annemarie Sullivan Palincsar is the Jean and Charles Walgreen Jr. Chair of Reading and Literacy, Arthur F. Thurnau Professor, and a teacher educator in educational studies at the University of Michigan. Her research focuses on the design of learning environments that support self-regulation in learning activity, especially for children who experience difficulty learning in school.



Annemarie completed her doctorate at the Center for the Study of Reading at the University of Illinois, Champaign-Urbana. She began her research with the design and investigation of *Reciprocal Teaching*, a form of reading comprehension instruction that takes place through a discussion, shaped by four comprehension monitoring strategies. In subsequent research, she has investigated, with science educator Shirley Magnusson, how children use literacy in the context of guided inquiry science instruction, what types of text support children's inquiry, and what support students who are identified as atypical learners require to be successful in this instruction.

In collaboration with Rand Spiro and Linda Kucan, she investigated the use of a hypermedia tool to support bringing to scale knowledge and practice regarding text comprehension instruction. In collaboration with Bridget Dalton from the Center for Applied Special Technologies, she studied the use of digital texts to support children to interpret and learn from graphics-rich science text.

Annemarie has served as a member of the National

Michael Fullan

Michael Fullan, professor emeritus of the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education of the University of Toronto, is an international leader on educational change. He has developed a number of partnerships designed to bring about major school improvements and is engaged in training, consulting, and evaluation of change projects around the world.



Michael and his colleagues have worked extensively with Microsoft's Partners in Learning (PiL) initiative. As part of their work with this initiative, they have written annotated summaries of what they consider to be the 20 best books on leadership and change, and they have named 10 top web sites for tools, instruments, and ideas for improving change leadership. Both the annotations and the web links are available at www.michaelfullan.ca.

Michael, a prolific author, now serves as special advisor to the Premier and Minister of Education in Ontario. His book, *Leading in a Culture of Change*, was awarded the 2002 Book of the Year Award by the National Staff Development Council; *Breakthrough* (with Peter Hill and Carmel Crévola) won the 2006 Book of the Year Award from the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education.

Many of Michael's books have direct implications for the work of SIM Professional Developers. In *Turnaround Leadership*, he expands the definition of organization turnaround and shows how leaders can convert even

Academy's Research Council on the Prevention of Reading Difficulty in Young Children, the OERI/RAND Reading Study Group, the National Research Council's Panel on Teacher Preparation, the National Education Goals Panel, and the National Advisory Board to Children's Television Workshop. She is co-editor of the journal *Cognition and Instruction* and is a member of the National Academy of Education

Among her recent publications is *Informed Choices for Struggling Adolescent Readers: A Research-Based Guide to Instructional Programs and Practices* (2007, Deshler, Palincsar, Biancarosa, & Nair; published by the International Reading Association) This book reviews many issues, including myths and misperceptions, associated with adolescent literacy; describes the process of enacting effective change; and provides a description of the instructional approach of 48 currently available programs as well as the professional development, evaluation base, and research base for each of the programs.

the worst situation into an opportunity to scale-up and rejuvenate their schools. In the book, he shows how entire systems can be transformed and examines the dynamics of what make societies—and education systems—healthy or sick. He identifies the positive things turnaround schools do to get off the critical list and explores what it takes to motivate large numbers of people to go beyond short-term solutions to achieve fundamental, sustainable reform. Ultimately, *Turnaround Leadership* focuses on the critical role of leadership—not the Lone Ranger leader who rides into town and saves a single school, but leaders whose very actions change the system they work in. (Jossey-Bass, 2006).

Other books by Michael to watch for are *Six Secrets of Change*, to be published by Jossey-Bass, and *What's Worth Fighting for in the Principalship*, to be published by Teachers College Press. Both books are expected to be published by March.
