

SIM & the Common Core State Standards Initiative

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In the past year, the fast-moving Common Core State Standards Initiative has grown from bare-bones beginnings to game-changing reality for schools and districts across the country. As of Oct. 20, 40 states had adopted the core academic standards aimed at preparing America's students for college and careers.

During the 2010 International SIM® Conference, SIM Professional Developers Tricia Bronger of Louisville, Ky., and Candace Bixler of Austin, Texas, led a session exploring the content of the common core

standards and what their adoption by so many states means for professional development.

The standards were developed through a collaboration involving the Council of Chief State School Officers, the National Governors Association, international partners, researchers, and many other stakeholders. They are organized into academic standards for English language arts and academic standards for literacy in history/social studies, science, and technical subjects. They establish specific grade-level standards for kindergarten through eighth-grade and use grade bands (9-10 and 11-12)

for high school expectations.

"When you look at these standards, especially the science and history literacy standards, they really are disciplinary literacy," says Candace, referring to the conference keynote address by Tim Shanahan, professor of urban education at the University of Illinois at Chicago. Accompanying the standards are appendixes that contain a wealth of helpful supplementary materials and a glossary. The materials include sample performance tasks and annotated writing samples at various grade levels.

The standards emphasize college and career readiness, organizing all other components under this umbrella. They also focus on results and accountability—rather than the means by which teachers achieve results—and promote a shared responsibility for students'

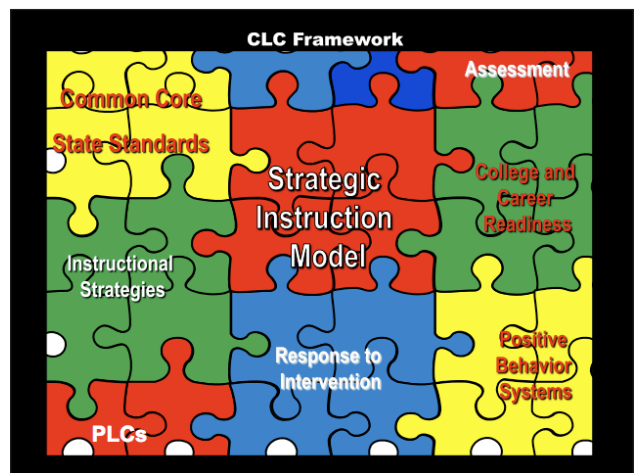
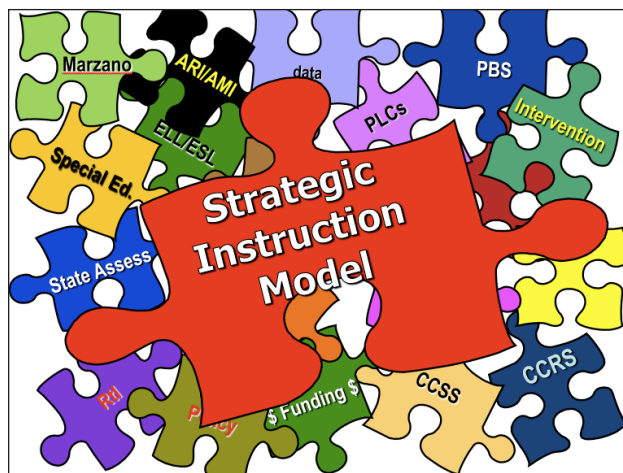
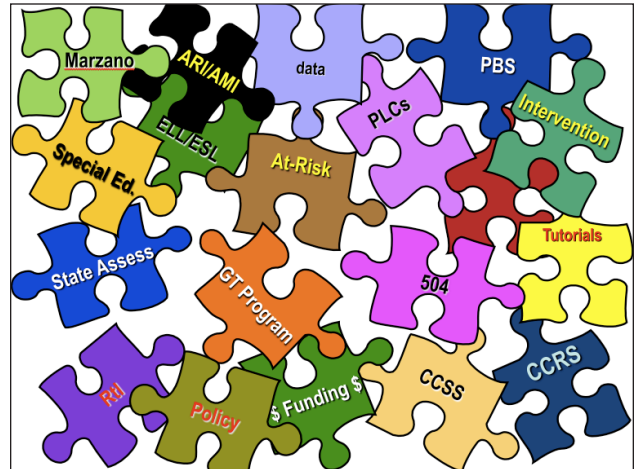
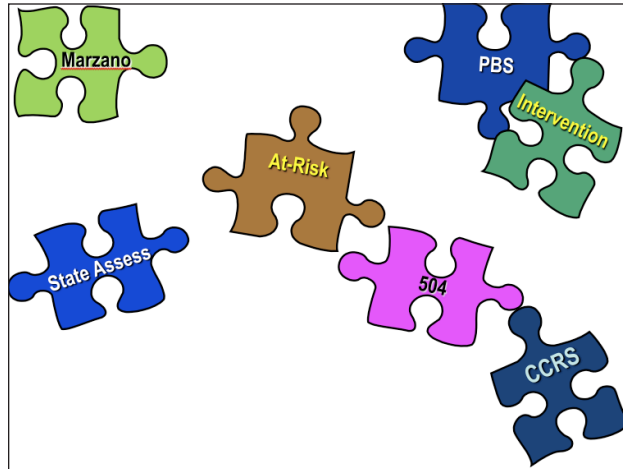

literacy development.

"It doesn't say, in this course, here's this standard," says Tricia. "It says, in this timeframe, this is what we're all responsible for."

The standards also are notable for what they are not. They are not a federally mandated effort—as evidenced by the leadership of the Council of Chief State School Officers and the National Governors Association—and they do not prescribe specific instructional practices.

"It will not say you need to teach the *Paraphrasing Strategy* for looking at main ideas and details and putting it in your own words," says Tricia. "It

won't tell you exactly what to do."

The standards also do not include differentiation for gifted and talented or advanced work or supports for students with special needs or English language learners.

The empty spaces represent a prime opportunity for SIM Professional Developers. Think about the missing pieces as you prepare for workshops. What SIM components can fill in the gaps for a school or district? What unique challenges exist for a school, district, or state, and what role can you play in conversations about those issues at each level? Can CLC provide the framework a

district needs as it evaluates its programs and initiatives in light of the core standards?

As you consider how to integrate SIM, the standards, and other initiatives, you might want to conduct a discussion with your colleagues or workshop participants about the benefits of having common core standards from state to state. Participants in the core standards session at the summer conference identified several potential benefits:

- *Mobility of students and teachers.* Common standards could help with the transition when students or teachers move from district to

district within a state or from one state to another.

- *Equity.* Some schools do not provide everything students need to be ready for college or careers.
- *College expectations.* Students applying to out-of-state colleges would have the same preparation and be able to compete equally with in-state students.
- *Communication.* Common standards may provide increased opportunities for shared conversations about specific strategies and supports.

Tricia, Candace, and session participants brainstormed a list of other activities you might incorporate into your workshops to help participants understand core standards and SIM in light of other initiatives they already are involved in:

- Do a “brain dump” in which participants list all of the initiatives they already have in place, and then help them see that SIM is not just one more thing to add to their list. “We have to get them to realize that we’re here to help,” says Candace.
- Use a “pieces of the puzzle” PowerPoint activity developed by Candace (see example on page 2). Puzzle pieces appear on the screen one at the time, each one labeled with the names of initiatives under way within a district. When all of the initiatives pieces are scattered across the screen, put them together and overlay SIM as a way to begin making connections and CLC as the framework to put the whole puzzle together. a copy of Candace’s puzzle pieces PowerPoint from the SIM General Information section of SIMville.)

- Use a “plus-delta” activity to have participants indicate which initiatives they think are working well and which aren’t.
- Use SIM tools, such as the Frame or Concept Diagram, to explore aspects of the standards or to show connections with SIM.
- Conduct a research pass. Highlight important passages from several research articles. Distribute them to participants, who read one passage and then pass it on to the next person until all have read the relevant passages.

- Use SMARTER planning to plan your workshops. To illustrate how SIM and the common core standards can be woven in to any course, Candace demonstrated how to construct a unit using SMARTER planning and an integrated set of Content Enhancement Routines (*Course and Unit Organizer, Concept Anchoring, Concept Mastery, and Question Exploration*). Her course, in keeping with the conference’s Star Trek-inspired theme, was government of the United Federation of Planets. How will the SIM Virtual Conference work?

You will register for the virtual conference just as you would for a face-to-face conference. We will send you a package of conference sessions on DVDs, a USB drive containing handouts from the 2010 International SIM Conference, links to additional online content, and instructions for completing the virtual conference.

You will be expected to watch each DVD, complete activities associated with each session, and reflect on how you can use the information in your work. You must complete an online evaluation for each session before you receive credit for attending an update.

Does this fulfill the requirement to attend an update every two years to remain an active member of the International Professional Development Network?

Yes, the SIM® Virtual Conference fulfills your update requirement. Remember, to be considered active in the SIM Network, you must attend an update every two years and subscribe to *Strateworks*.

Can I stop attending face-to-face conferences and just complete my updates virtually?

No. You may attend a virtual conference in lieu of a face-to-face conference every four years. In the interim, you must attend at least one face-to-face conference to maintain your active status within the network. In addition, you must have attended at least one face-to-face conference in the past before you can register for the virtual conference.

How much does the virtual conference cost?

The cost is \$350. However, you will not have the travel and lodging costs associated with attending a face-to-face conference.

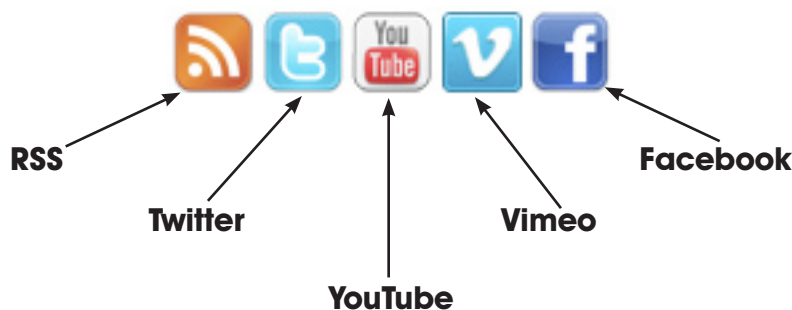
