Virtual Success

For several weeks this winter, 40 members of the International Professional Development Network participated in the first full-blown SIM® Virtual Conference. We designed the virtual conference as a new option for members of the network to fulfill their update requirement, and based on preliminary feedback, the format is a success.

We built the conference around the sessions presented at the 2010 International SIM® Conference, using a combination of DVDs and online videos produced as a result of the international conference. All participants viewed Tim Shanahan's keynote address, tributes to the 2010 award recipients, poster session presentations, and brief pecha-kucha presentations of KUCRL research. In addition, when they registered, participants selected one strand (either "SIM and Literacy" or "SIM as a Change Agent") and three additional sessions. A secure virtual conference website provided instructions and supplemental information, including an online assets webquest designed to help participants become familiar with all KUCRL online offerings.



Participants had about a month to complete all activities. Because virtual conference participants were scattered far and wide, we looked for ways to promote interaction and reflection. A forum on the virtual conference website offered one way for participants to discuss content or ask questions. We also scheduled three webinars for participants to talk with Patty Graner, director of professional development, about what they were learning and how to apply new information to their work. At least one small group of participants who lived close enough to each other gathered 2011 SIM® Virtual Conference website

to complete some parts of the virtual conference together. Participants also were required to complete evaluations for each session and for the conference overall. Evaluation questions prompted them to think about the usefulness of the information and provided valuable feedback for us on the conference format.

The virtual format does present some drawbacks. Participants missed reconnecting with old friends, for example. But in general, the evaluations we have received so far have been positive.

"Overall, the SIM Virtual Confer-

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ence was a very good experience," wrote one participant. "It was a nice alternative, saved me some money and time off from school."

Registration cost for the virtual conference was \$100 more than for the international conference. Participants saved money on travel and lodging costs and were able to complete activities when convenient for their schedules without taking time away from their jobs.

Based on the success of this year's virtual conference, we expect to offer another next year. SIM Professional Developers may attend a virtual conference in lieu of a face-to-face conference every four years. In the interim, you must attend at least one faceto-face conference to maintain your active status within the network. In addition, you must attend at least one face-to-face conference before you can register for a virtual conference.

SLC interim director named, work to transition to KUCRL

For the past several months, the Strategic Learning Center (SLC) board of directors, KUCRL researchers, and SLC personnel have been involved in a series of conversations about how to best pursue the work of developing, validating, and promoting the implementation of the Content Literacy Continuum® (CLC)—the glue that addresses how schools can best implement a set of research-based practices to improve student success. This discussion came about because several of the major contracts that had sustained the SLC over the past six years will soon be coming to an end, and availability of federal funding related to supporting the implementation of wide-scale adolescent literacy efforts, such as represented in the Strategic Instruction Model® and CLC, have not increased as we had anticipated. Additionally, many of the tasks performed by the SLC and KUCRL have a significant degree of overlap. Before arriving at a decision, discussions were informed through interactions with professional developers who provide services for the SLC as well as SLC clients. Additionally, a survey was sent to randomly selected professional developers who have provided services for the SLC and SLC clients.

Going forward, there will be some changes that will leverage the collaborative work of the SLC and KUCRL to best promote the work around the CLC framework. We are pleased to announce that Susan D'Aniello will be serving as the interim executive director of the SLC as we move to grow and to develop the vision related to work with the CLC, KUCRL, and the schools we serve. The board is very excited that Susan has agreed to take on this position. We hope that you will give her your full support.

Additionally, the current work of the SLC will gradually be moved to KUCRL, and new work being started and negotiated will now be assumed by KUCRL. Actions will be taken to ensure that all current contract obligations will be met with no disruption in any services.

During this transition period, the SLC's office hours have been redesigned; they will be open Monday through Thursday. Here, for your reference, is the SLC contact information. All email addresses and phone numbers remain the same; the postal address is new.

The 2011 International SIM® Conference continues our in-depth exploration of issues in literacy and education as they relate to the work that we all do within the International Professional Development Network. This year, writing skills and instruction and related professional development issues take top billing.

Designing Professional Learning to Have an Unmistakeable *Impact,* led by Jim Knight, describes high-leverage activities educational leaders can employ to design professional learning that has an unmistakable impact on teaching. You will be able to participate in two of the strands. Each strand will be offered once in the morning and once in the afternoon.

Other opportunities for professional learning during the conference will introduce you to new materials, prompt you to discuss what it means

to foster effective literacy leadership, and guide you through a look at the expanding role of technology in our professional development work. We also will hear from practitioners who have SIM success stories to share as well as from SIM Professional Developers who are doing innovative things in their work.

In The Right Stuff, Tom Wolfe's 1979 examination of the adventures of post-World War II test pilots and early astronauts, the "right stuff" was a combination of bravery and bravado, mental and physical toughness, and drive to be the best. In 2011, the Write Stuff means having the knowledge and professional development tools to help teachers provide effective writing instruction so they can help students achieve new heights as writers and as literate individuals. Q&A: Test-Taking Strategy

One of our professional developers posed the question below. We went to the expert—Charlie Hughes, one of the developers of the strategy—for answers.

Question:

There are two places in the *Test-Taking Strategy* manual stating that the guessing techniques should not be applied to standardized testing situations. All teachers learning the strategy have students who have to take standardized tests. The strategy is helping students on those tests, but when teachers ask about that statement, I'm not sure how to respond.

Answer:

The guessing strategies, especially the "choose the longest option technique," are based on poor item construction. That is, an item is constructed in such a way that it gives the test-taker a "clue" about which option to choose (or not choose) if they have to guess.

Generally, professional test constructors are aware of these flaws and make sure they are not contained in the tests they construct. Thus the guessing techniques do not work (or are not even relevant).

However, based on our analysis of classroom tests constructed by teachers as well as tests provided by curriculum publishers, these tests *do* contain items constructed in ways that will help "guessers." For example, our analysis of hundreds of classroom tests indicated that 80 percent of the tests included multiplechoice items in which one of the options was obviously longer or more detailed than the other options. That choice was the correct answer more than 75 percent of the time.

My message to teachers is to be straightforward with kids about when and when not to use the guessing strategies and that depending too much on them is not as good as actually studying and knowing the answer!

The rest of the strategy seems to be helpful for many students regardless of the type of test and who constructs it. —*Charlie Hughes*
