What the numbers tell us about SIM PD



Turnabout's fair play.

We ask you to submit reports detailing your experiences conducting professional development. Sometimes, this may seem like an insignificant part of being a SIM Professional Developer and you may wonder what happens to the information once you've turned it over to us.

To show how important this information is, we want to report back to you some of the things we've learned from your 2011 reports and from surveys of your participants. These numbers give all of us a clearer picture of what is happening in our SIM world and are vital to the continued operation and strength of the SIM Network.

Figure 1: Content Enhancement Routine sessions attended




Post-professional development participant survey results

Using email addresses gathered from registration of professional development forms and reports submitted by professional developers, we invited more than 1,500 individuals to respond to a follow-up survey to help us understand who attends workshops and what their needs are. Of those invited, 131 individuals responded to the survey.

The most-attended strategies and routines sessions are old favorites: *Unit Organizer Routine, Framing Routine,* and *Course Organizer Routine* came in tops among Content Enhancement Routine offerings (figure 1), and *Fundamentals* and *Proficiency in the Sentence Writing Strategy* and the

Figure 2: Learning Strategies sessions attended



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
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



Figure 3: Extent to which respondents would recommend strategy or routine

Paragraph Writing Strategy topped the Learning Strategies list (figure 2).

When we asked respondents to what extent they would recommend these interventions to others, 52 percent said "always" and 41 percent said "sometimes." "Seldom" and "unsure" accounted for just 7 percent of responses (figure 3).

The responses also offer a glimpse of who is attending SIM instruction and workshops. The overwhelming majority of respondents (94 percent) worked in schools (high school—35 percent; middle school or junior high school—35 percent; elementary—24 percent) (figure 4). Almost half of our participants (46 percent) worked in suburban schools, with 30 percent in rural and 23 percent in urban settings (figure 5).




Figure 7: Content areas





Figure 8: Student populations

Special education teachers made

up 41 percent of participants, and 37 percent were content teachers (figure 6). A third of the content teachers taught English language arts, while 21 percent taught math and 20 percent taught social studies (figure 7). Respondents represented a wide range of student populations (figure 8).

Professional developer reports

We received 349 session reports from 148 SIM Professional Developers in 2011. The number of participants reported as attending these sessions was 3,224 (though only 47 percent of reports indicated the number of participants attending the session).

Not surprisingly, the most frequently offered strategies and routines were almost the same as those listed as most frequently attended in the participant survey.

Fundamentals and Proficiency in the Sentence Writing Strategy and the Paragraph Writing Strategy were the top three for Learning Strategies. The top Content Enhancement Routines were the Framing Routine, Unit Organizer Routine, and Vocabulary LINCing Routine.

In looking at the number of professional development sessions reported by state, the top five states were Florida, Virginia, Georgia, Indiana, and Michigan.

What it all means

So what do these numbers tell us and why are they important?

The information we collect from participant surveys and your reports is helpful to KUCRL researchers

Figure 6: Respondent roles

on many fronts. When we apply for grants, your reports allow us to write authoritatively about the demographics of who is engaging in SIM instruction and where. Such statistics strengthen the quality of our proposals and better position us in the competition for limited funds.

Likewise, the responses from session participants about their learning and implementation experiences shape our future recommendations for professional development. The responses often are useful in the proposal writing process, too.

Finally, we often receive requests from individuals who are interested in learning where SIM instruction is offered or where SIM has been implemented. We don't know if you don't tell us.

So what does this mean to you? We beseech you to report information about your sessions regularly. We

SIM by the numbers, 2011

- 427 people attended 7 SIM updates and conferences
 - That number includes 52 people who attended the SIM virtual conference
- 76 SIM Professional Developers became certified from August 2010 to July 2011
 - 21 became certified from August 2011 to present
- Professional developers submitted 353 professional development sessions reports in 2011 and 369 in 2010
 - Of those, 250 reports were submitted using the new online reporting system
- 112 people receive electronic Stratenotes (23 percent of recipients) vs. 382 hard copy recipients

Farthest from home*

Lawrence, Kan., may be the center of the SIM universe, but the reach of the professional development network is extensive. Two locations stand out among the farflung places SIM touched in 2011.

- Tuntutuliak, Alaska (3,200 miles from Lawrence). SIM Professional Developer Joel Thomas offered Fundamentals in the Sentence Writing Strategy.
- Bogota, Colombia (2,700 miles from Lawrence).
 SIM Professional Developer Allison Lee offered the Framing Routine and Unit Organizer Routine.

Jim Knight keynote: Learning Adults for Learning Students

For more than three decades, KUCRL has studied and promoted the importance of learning. Our view has always been that children have a much greater chance of succeeding if they learn how to learn. As we have studied professional learning, we have come to a second conclusion: Children have a much better chance of succeeding if the adults who teach them continue to be learners.

Fortunately, research has identified simple practices that

stand at the heart of personal and organizational learning. During this session, you'll hear stories that illustrate each practice and learn how those practices are inherent to the professional learning processes of instructional coaching, impact schools, partnership learning, and intensive learning teams that have been developed at KUCRL over more than a decade of research. Finally, you'll hear how those processes can be employed to promote widespread adoption and deep implementation of SIM.

ease some of the travel and lodging issues associated with attending the conference, allowing participants to fly in Monday evening or Tuesday morning and stay for the entire conference. Our goal is to create a schedule that is conducive to your full participation in conference events.

SIM & Common Core State Standards

Common Core State Standards, adopted by all but a few states, have become a big topic of conversation in the education world. The standards weave reading and writing expectations throughout the curriculum, in all subjects at all grade levels.

We are offering two classes this spring to help classroom teachers understand connections between SIM and the Common Core State Standards and, ultimately, to better enable students to meet the increased reading and writing demands they face. Both classes will be held April 16-19 in Lawrence, Kan.

SIM Reading and Writing Strategies and the Common Core State Standards is for middle school and high school teachers who are charged with providing powerful reading and writing strategies that support the Common Core State Standards and promote student success. The class will introduce participants to the foundations of SIM and will teach *Proficiency in the Sentence Writing Strategy, the LINCS Vocabulary*

Strategy, the Inference Strategy, and Fundamentals of Paraphrasing and Summarizing. Participants will have time to plan how to use the strategies with their students.

SIM Content Enhancement Routines and the Common Core State Standards will introduce teachers to a selection of routines from the Content Enhancement Series. Participants will learn about and plan how to implement the following routines in their own classrooms: Course Organizer Routine, Unit Organizer Routine, Concept Mastery Routine, and Question Exploration Routine. Teachers who use these routines will better prepare their students to meet the literacy and higher-order thinking demands they face in the classroom.
