### IT'S ELEMENTARY, DEAR WATSON!

Over the course of its existence, the University of Kansas Center for Research on Learning (KU-CRL) has become known for its innovative work in the area of secondary education. Over the past ten years, however, many of the projects conducted under KU-CRL auspices and associated with the Strategies Intervention Model have taken place in elementary classrooms. Some of the latest materials that have been published are to be used primarily at the elementary level. Has the Center broadened its focus? YES!!

What is abundantly clear is that students can be taught to be strategic even in the early elementary grades, and elementary teachers need to enhance their instruction as much as secondary teachers do. Our job as trainers is to ensure that strategic instruction starts as early as possible so that students do not reach seventh grade with such a large gap between what they are expected to do and what they can do. We need to ensure that a scope and sequence of strategic instruction is available across the grades so that students make successful transitions at each critical point in their educational programs.

Throughout the nation, the elementary focus is being added to district-wide programs. Tremendous creativity is in evidence, and teachers are making great progress in helping their students become strategic learners in the elementary grades. Some districts have formally instituted strategies programs that span the grades K-12. Regular educators as well as special educators are involved in these programs; they work together using combinations of intensive instruction and mainstream instruction, solo teaching and

team teaching, and strategies instruction and content enhancement. The possibilities seem bounded only by teachers' creativity. Some of the successful applications we've seen include the following:

### The Word Identification Strategy

The Word Identification Strategy is being taught at the elementary level through the use of the prerequisite lessons new contained in the revised manual. Elementary students are being taught to read prefixes and suffixes and to identify them in words. When spelling words are first presented to students, they are DISSECTed either by the teacher (at first) or by the class (later) through a guided practice activity. Students write them in DISSECTed form on their papers or on cards for later study. Student pairs or small groups can quiz each other emphasizing the spelling of the small parts of each word. The Visual Imagery Strategy and the Self-Questioning Strategy

These two strategies are being taught in small reading groups in both mainstream and special classes at the elementary level. The instructions and materials in the manuals emphasize small group practice and guided practice as well as independent practice. Teachers are reinforcing use of these strategies throughout the school day by encouraging applications of the strategies in all subjects, during discussions, and during assignments.

The Paraphrasing Strategy
The Paraphrasing Strategy is being taught in the upper elementary grades, and prerequisite skills for the strategy are being taught in the earlier grades. These prerequisite skills include identifying key words in pictures, sentences, and paragraphs, identifying synonyms for key words, rephrasing a sentence, identifying main ideas and details in pictures and paragraphs, and making statements about those main ideas and details. Barbara Glaeser, a current graduate student at the KU-CRL, is in the

process of refining and validating her preskills package for the Paraphrasing Strategy. It should be ready for the 1995-96 school year.

The Sentence Writing Strategy and the Error Monitoring Strategy

Teachers are teaching lower elementary students to write the four types of simple sentences. Upper elementary students are learning to write compound and complex sentences and to use the Error Monitoring Strategy. In mainstream classes, students are being given writing assignments and are being asked to check each sentence using the "COPS" Questions. They make a chart at the top of their page showing, with checkmarks, that each sentence was checked for each type of error. The Paragraph Writing Strategy

Teachers are teaching elementary students to structure their paragraphs using the Idea Diagram in mainstream as well as resource classrooms. Students sometimes work in cooperative groups to create a diagram for their paragraphs and then write the paragraph independently or as a group.

### The Test Taking Strategy

Teachers have taught the Test Taking Strategy to elementary students and are guiding their students through tests, prompting them to use each step of the strategy. Students who need extra time to work through the test in this fashion (more time for sections for the test) are guided through the strategy in the resource room.

#### The LINCS Strategy

Teachers are combining instruction in the Word Identification Strategy and the LINCS Strategy as spelling words and vocabulary words are presented. Students make a card for each word on which the word is DISSECTed and the other elements of the LINCS cards are included. Students who need additional time to learn the words are given that time in the resource room. The Math Strategies Series

successful in producing successful math learning for all students that it is being adopted as the math curriculum in many elementary classrooms. It is also being used to supplement the main math curriculum. Since most learning disabled students typically reach the seventh grade without learning the basic math facts, this curriculum is a critical component to any program serious about teaching these skills to these students and preventing later math failure and math phobia. The Cooperative Strategies Series

The SCORE Skills are being taught to all elementary students, and the Teamwork Strategy is being taught successfully in the upper elementary grades. Teachers are permeating their classroom environments with this instruction, and as a result, students with disabilities are truly being socially integrated in those classrooms. Indeed, their acceptance by peers improves over time when this instruction is implemented.

To summarize, the Strategies Intervention Model is alive and well at the elementary level. It's elementary, dear Watson, to realize that SIM is no longer just a secondary program! Additional elementary programs are currently being developed and validated at the KU-CRL to round out the program at this level. We encourage everyone to consider how training programs can be expanded into the elementary level. For more ideas, obtain the videotape entitled "Teaching Younger Students to Master Learning Strategies" which features Sheryl Block demonstrating strategy instruction at the elementary level.

# TRANSPORTATION

Plan to fly into Kansas City's Mid-continent International Airport. Some travel agents will want to send you to Topeka, but transportation from the Kansas City Airport to Lawrence is much easier. The Kansas City Airport, located northeast of Lawrence, is approximately an hour drive from Lawrence. You may want to rent a car or use the transportation service described below. If you are driving from the airport to Lawrence, take I-435 directed to Topeka and then I-70 west. Leave the turnpike at the east Lawrence exit if you are staying at the Eldridge Hotel or the Halcyon House. For other places, the west exit is more convenient.

The A-1 City Cab Airport Shuttle Service (call 1 800-736-1090 or 913-842-2432 for reservations) You must make reservations at least one week in advance. The cost is \$19 one way and \$37 round trip. They make 10 daily trips at intervals of an hour and fifteen minutes. The first interval begins at 8:30 a.m.; the last regular airport departure time is 11:00 p.m. The shuttle will deliver you to any address in Lawrence. However, it will only pick up passengers at the Eldridge Hotel, Days Inn Motel, Holidome, and the Kansas Student Union where the workshop is being held. Be sure to mention the Center in order to get these rates.

Rick's Airport Service provides door to door service twenty-four hours a day. The charge for one person is \$40 one way. Any additional riders are \$5. This may be a good alternative if you are traveling in a group or during irregular hours. If out the state of Kansas use the 800 # 1-800-331-6796 or in Kansas 913-651-4649

Within the city of Lawrence, taxicabs are available. Fares are between \$4 and \$7 depending on the distance of your ride. A-1 City Cab phone number is 913-842-2432.
