1997 national conference

Active Participation

A number of presentations emphasized the importance of actively engaging students or workshop participants in the learning process. **Bev Colombo** led session participants through a number of activities, including forming an opinion line. This activity required participants to take a stand on an issue and arrange themselves in a line according to how strongly they felt about the issue. Bev then folded the line in half so the participants with the strongest opposing viewpoints faced each other and discussed their positions. Afterwards, participants were given the opportunity to change their place in the opinion line based on their discussions.

Bev, who adapted some of her material from the work of the conference's keynote speaker, **Anita Archer**, offered the following hints for successfully using active participation:

- Use active participation regularly. Make it a constant part of your repertoire.
- Try one type of active participation at a time to avoid confusion.
- Plan carefully. Bev recommended writing in your manual the kind of active responses you plan to seek at each point, especially the first few times you do it.

Motivation

Don Deshler, Ed Ellis, and Mike Hock joined forces for a discussion of motivation. Don gave an overview, based on the work of keynote speaker Michael Pressley, of factors that undermine motivation in children.

Most children begin school with high expectations for success, he said, yet some lose that over time as practices such as pitting children against each other in competition for grades wear them down.

Don offered the following suggestions for increasing motivation:

- reward personal improvement, not just the product
- make academic tasks more interesting
- maintain high but doable expectations
- · praise students
- implement strategies for academic success
- recognize the importance of the teacher serving as a mentor
- help students shift the attribution for their success from luck to effort
- explore Possible Selves

Mike presented more information about the last point, the Possible Selves motivational program. He discussed the benefits of encouraging students to envision their hopes, expectations, and fears for the future. Most learners have these visions, he said, but some of the students we work with don't know

- Develop your own, ageappropriate style.
- · Allow time for thinking.
- · Provide variety.

Bev's presentation fit nicely with a special session Anita presented on adding zip to presentations. Anita demonstrated many more ways to involve students in learning, which result in numerous benefits for both teachers and students.

Jim Knight presented a halfday workshop on Partnership Learning, a way for educators to present information so participants are equal partners in the learning process. Jim described six partnership strategies or tools that can be used to increase the effectiveness of learning sessions:

- Question recipes are simple questions staff developers can use to open up conversation to all session participants.
- Cooperative learning involves learners working in groups to teach themselves the content being covered.
- Thinking devices are objects (film clips, photographs, vignettes, a literary work, a song) presented for a group of learners to critically analyze through dialogue.
- Discussion devices are carefully structured team learning activities designed to enable learners to reflect on how they can apply content being covered to

- their careers or personal lives.
- Experiential learning allows learners to experience the precise phenomenon they are exploring. Facilitators employ experiential learning to create experiences that enable learners to act out the behaviors, strategies, or other content being learned.
- Effective stories are entertaining and engaging, and they give learners a concrete context in which to place abstract ideas. Stories make ideas real.

how to achieve their visions. The Possible Selves program aims to help clarify for students how to reach goals and avoid feared futures. Possible Selves is described in detail in *Strategram*, Volume 9, Issue 4, which was published in June 1997.

Ed offered additional incites into the elements required to maintain healthy motivation, emphasizing three: a sense of personal potency, authentic learning opportunities, and a safe environment for risk taking.

Personal potency is related to a sense of belonging, of being needed and valued, of making a contribution, and of having control over your own destiny.

"When you think about what much of high school and middle school experience is, it's really about power and whether teachers are in power or whether kids are in power," he said.

Students at that age are trying to exercise some control over their own destiny, even to the point of failing on purpose because they don't want to take the risk of trying and failing accidentally.

"A lot of the danger you see kids involved in is just trying to take control of their situation. And what do we do to kids? We take that control away," he said.

Authentic learning means providing opportunities for students to become involved in projects and other learning experiences that have more authentic outcomes than some traditional approaches to education have offered.

"So much of what we do is artificial to kids," Ed said. "It's very much setting up the school game. So what we're teaching kids to do is school compliance. As long as the learning experience is not -authentic to the student, we've got some really major motivation problems."

Ed cited encouraging examples of teachers moving away from traditional tests, shifting student evaluation to portfolios and rubric-based criteria. In these classrooms, the emphasis shifts from absolute right or absolute wrong to an overall view of the

Awards

Learning Community

A special Building a Learning Community session brought interested people together to look closely at StrateNet, the features it offers now, and the kind of virtual community tool our training community would like for it to be in the future.

As a group, session participants described the ideal virtual community as

- · supportive
- a place to ask and answer questions
- a place that provides recognition
- a place to cheer on the efforts of other community members
- · user friendly
- a means of staying in touch with each other and with news from the field
- diverse in terms of ideas and people
- a place for networking and exchange
- a repository of new and existing information

With these thoughts in mind, we discussed how StrateNet can evolve to meet the needs of our thriving group. Participants offered a variety of suggestions for content and capabilities that would be valuable to the community.

- Participants would like the ability to order materials through StrateNet. We are investigating the possibilities of doing this in the future.
- · Several members agreed

StrateNet should be a vehicle for lending support after training. It should be a place for teachers to make a connection to trainers when they are looking for advice or have problems with a strategy.

- · StrateNet should be a virtual library where all community members can find a wealth of information related to the Strategic Instruction Model. Among the items suggested for depositing in this library are lesson plans, concept diagrams, unit organizers, and anchoring diagrams. We are beginning this process by placing articles from back issues of Strategram in a special Strategram Archives section of StrateNet.
- The group also agreed that providing an index and keyword search function for the StrateNet archives will be vital when trainers or teachers seek specific information.

We're taking this list and beginning to revamp the content of StrateNet. As we progress, we hope more of you will offer suggestions and opinions about the usefulness of this tool for you as a member of the learning community. student's understanding across a continuum. At the top of the continuum is a very sophisticated understanding and the bottom is very superficial and erroneous. Every student falls somewhere along the continuum. The result is a more authentic learning experience and a more authentic assessment.

In discussing the third element, a safe environment for risk taking, Ed described a social studies classroom he had visited in which students freely discussed the content, providing incites and differing points of view in a calm give-and-take. He was so impressed by one student's contributions that he followed the student to his next class. There, Ed found the student silent and

withdrawn for the entire period. The difference, Ed said, is that the social studies teacher provided a safe environment for risk taking that was lacking in the other class.
