# Your strategy for the 21st: Don't miss SIM conference

The 1999 National SIM
Trainers' Conference promises
to be an exciting and
informative event for all
members of the SIM family.

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The conference theme, "Strategies for the 21st," reflects the 21st year of the Center for Research on Learning and the approach of the 21st Century. The conference will be July 8-10 at the Holidome in Lawrence, Kansas. Here's a sample of some of the sessions we plan to offer:

### Featured sessions

Two general sessions will anchor the conference presentations: "Language-Sensitive SIM" on Thursday, July 8, and "Instruction of Students with Learning Disabilities: What Matters?" on Friday, July 9. After each general session, the presenter will lead a special workshop to take a closer look at related issues.

- Language-Sensitive SIM: Barbara Ehren, a SIM Trainer from the School District of Palm Beach County, Florida, kicked off a two-year look at the various ways in which attention to the language variable can enhance the effectiveness of SIM Trainers in her February Stratenotes article, "Language-sensitive SIM: Part 1." In the article, Barbara stated that language ability should be considered up front as a factor in all strategies intervention. Our understanding of language and its disorders should guide our training and teaching approaches with both the Learning Strategies Curriculum and the Content Enhancement Series. In this session, Barbara will continue the discussion of how we can better address the underlying problems of students.
- Instruction of Students with Learning Disabilities: What Matters? Naomi Zigmond of the University of Pittsburgh will use personal experiences and research evidence in her exploration of the critical features of appropriate and effective instruction for students with learning disabilities. The

#### **New manuals 1999**

We plan several sessions on three new manuals: the *Course Organizer Routine*, the *THINK Strategy*, and *Proficiency in Sentence Writing*. We also hope to present the *InSPECT Strategy*.

#### Course Organizer Routine:

The new Course Organizer Routine answers the following critical questions: How do you select and share performance options? How do you create a course notebook, bulletin board, and portfolio? How do you develop and share content and process standards? This new version of the Course Organizer Routine has a different look from earlier versions and will include additional components that should be addressed when launching a new course. The routine spends much more time focusing on the process of setting up community within the classroom. This session will provide a training overview of all Course

Organizer components and introduce the new Course Organizer components.

# The THINK Strategy:

Strategies for the

Students use the THINK Strategy, a new strategy in the Cooperative Thinking Strategies series, when working together in teams to systematically solve problems in different content areas. Students

learn how to analyze and identify a problem, examine what's been done in the past, brainstorm new solutions, discuss advantages and disadvantages of new solutions, choose the

best solution, devise a plan to implement the solution, and process how the group worked together.

**Proficiency in Sentence** Writing: This presentation will focus on the revisions to the Sentence Writing Strategy program, which now consists of two levels of instruction. Fundamentals of Sentence Writing can be used to teach the fundamental concepts and skills associated with writing simple sentences, starting with concepts such as "subject," "verb," "infinitive," and "preposition." The program includes an instructor's manual and a student materials volume. The program can be used as a developmental curriculum for younger students or as a "quick and dirty" review for older students. Proficiency in Sentence Writing picks up where Fundamentals leaves off and provides instruction in compound, complex, and compound-complex sentence writing. It also consists of an instructor's manual and a student materials volume. Proficiency in Sentence Writing is new this year; Fundamentals was introduced during the 1998 National SIM Trainers' Conference.

• InSPECT Strategy: The InSPECT Strategy has been

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developed to assist students in detecting and correcting spelling errors in work generated with a computer-based spellchecker. It also can be adapted for use with hand-held spellcheckers. Students who learn to use the InSPECT Strategy understand the importance of producing written work that is free of spelling errors and can effectively proofread and correct their own work.

### New manuals in 1998

In addition, we plan sessions on each of the following manuals, which were introduced during the 1998 conference:

- Framing Routine
- Practicing the Storage Strand Strategies
- Quality Assignment Routine
- Recall Enhancement Routine

#### Other sessions

In addition to the general sessions and the sessions on new manuals, the conference will feature many sessions guaranteed to pique your interest.

- Red Hot and New: Jerri Neduchal plans a rocking good time for participants of this session, who will come away with many new ideas for spicing up their training sessions.

# Camaraderie in paradise: SIM Trainers recharge

If you are looking for new, exciting experiences in a place that has all the characteristics of paradise, you will want to join other members of the SIM Network at the second SIM Trainers Update Conference on St. John Island, February 9-12, 2000.

In late April 1999, a small group of SIM Trainers met for four days at Maho Bay Camps on St. John Island, U.S. Virgin Islands, for the first Strategic Instruction Model conference at that site. The cultural and climate changes contributed to the rich intellectual exchange of ideas among the participants. Each morning, the group met for four hours in an outdoor pavilion on a high bluff overlooking the beauty of Maho Bay of the Caribbean Ocean. The spectacular setting seemed to stimulate the interactive flow of SIM knowledge and questions and inspired many original thoughts and responses. Speakers were challenged to maintain their original agenda.

The new Course Organizer Routine manual and all the other new Content Enhancement Routines and Learning Strategies were the focus of attention. The group was small enough that everyone attending had the opportunity to present a favorite aspect of her or his teaching and training repertoire. The exchange of knowledge continued into each afternoon and evening with group activities on the beach, on a catamaran, or in learning about the natural history and human history of the island. Most members of the group took advantage of the opportunity to snorkel in the most beautiful water in the world. Of course, as SIM tradition does have it, shopping was a must on Saturday afternoon with local artists displaying their wares at an outdoor fair in honor of Earth Day.

Flexibility and an adjustment to island life were essential components of this experience. The Maho Bay Camp is an unusual entity in itself. With an ecological emphasis, 114 tent-cottages are nestled into the side of a hillside among the trees. Neighbors are isolated

from each other because of the density of the foliage. Boardwalks with numerous stairs join all of the huts with each other, the beach, and the core of the village, which is the outdoor restaurant, small store, and the information/activities director station. In the evenings, Maho Bay always provides special entertainment. Those who do not want to stay in the tent-cottages may spend more money for quarters in cabins that offer more creature comforts to guests. These cabins are located higher on the hill above the tent-cottages.

The unusual aspects of St. John included a 20-minute ride on the ferry from St. Thomas Island; rides in the typical St. John taxi, which is a pickup truck with wooden seats in the back for passengers; feral donkeys along the roads; and cars with steering wheels on their left driven on the left-hand side of the narrow mountain roads. Passengers beware!

The beauty of the island is found everywhere in the brilliant blue water, the stars in the night sky that sparkle like dancers, the beautiful flowering vegetation, the gorgeous children, and the spectacular fish and other marine organisms.

You may want to rent a car or use the transportation services described below. If you are driving from the airport to Lawrence, take the I-435 Topeka exit and then I-70 west. # **Trainers** speak at international LD summit

Several members of the International SIM Trainers' Network participated in the recent Keys to Successful Learning: A National Summit on Research in Learning Disabilities in Washington, D.C.

The summit brought together policy makers, administrators, researchers, and practitioners to share information and plan the next steps in bridging the gap between research and practice.

Sue Woodruff, a SIM Trainer and Teacher Consultant at Muskegon, Michigan, High School, spoke in a session showcasing examples of how educators have successfully implemented research-based practices in the classroom. The session was titled "Reading, Writing, and Higher Order Learning: Research-Based Practice in Action." Don Deshler. director of the Center for Research on Learning, also participated in this session as a panelist.

Carl Skordahl, Director of Special Education, Educational Service Center in Osseo (Minnesota) Area Schools, participated in a panel discussion with teacher training professionals from around the country who are making research-based instruction a reality. The title of the session was "State and Local Districts That Are Making It Work."

Don also spoke during the summit on "Moving Research into the Hands of Educators: Practices that Enhance Student Learning."

Strategic Instruction Model to new levels in a session titled How to Set Up Action Research Studies.

- Participants will learn about the Possible Selves Strategy during Mike Hoch's presentation.
- Translating Research into Practice: Jim Knight will focus on a research-validated program of working with individuals, groups, and schools. Jim promises that participants will receive an abundance of valuable materials.
- Jim also plans to present an update of the **Strategic Advantage** project and to share the library of Course and Unit Organizers developed for sophomores in an integrated curriculum.
- Writing Strategies: Keli Gustafson and Jim Knight will explore the process of developing a kindergarten to fifth-grade scope and sequence program for the writing strategies. The session will include the modifications made to Fundamentals of Sentence Writing for students in kindergarten through second grade.
